We have the knowledge at our command to remedy the deterioration of our urban environment. Why are we not using it? How can it be brought to bear?

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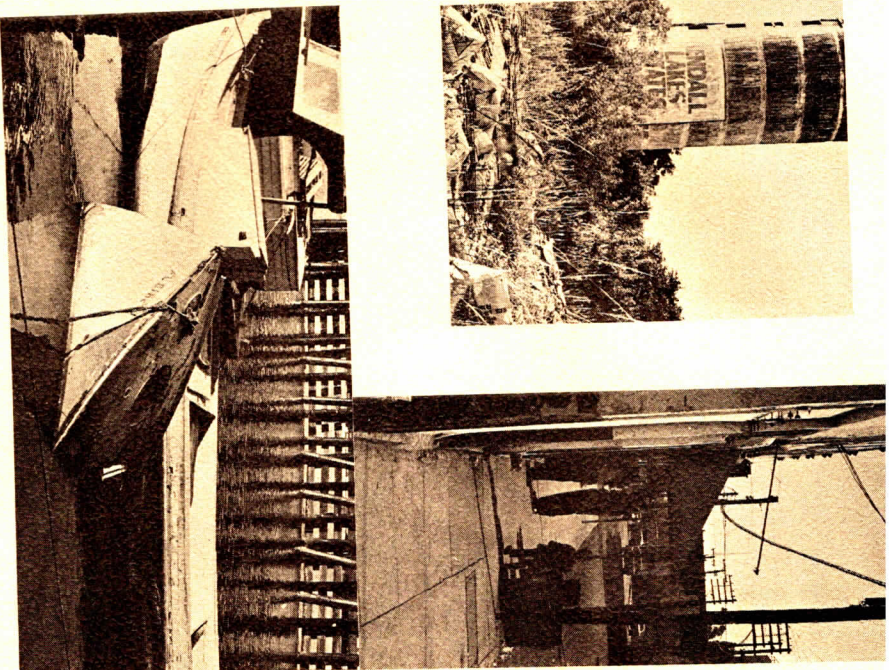
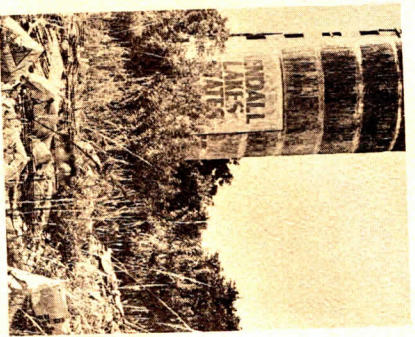

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The dinosaurs became extinct because they could not adapt rapidly enough to a changing environment. Is man changing his environment more rapidly than he can adapt to it?

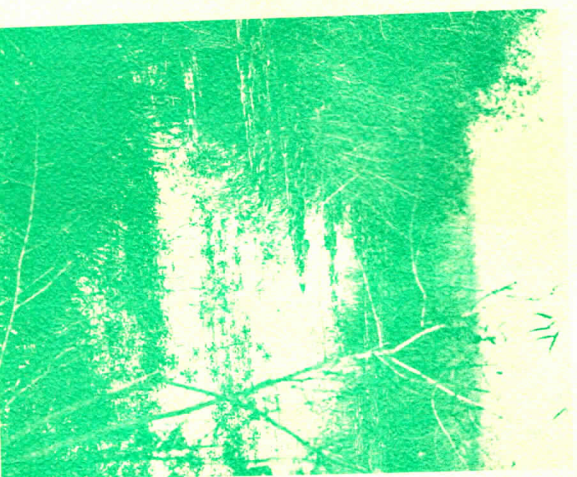
